Presented by Casey Sugarman, Willing Results LC. Casey Sugarman, a comparative veterinary biologist, has developed Partnership Engineering, an applied "choice-modification skillsetcurriculum." After helping the animal normalize, Casey can teach the owner to



communicate with horses or any other animal - even humans using this same set of tools. (Animal Science Classroom)

Organic Floral Design: Keeping it "Green"

Presented by Catherine Epright, Owner/Floral Designer, Green Dahlia



This hands-on workshop will introduce techniques used to reduce the "mechanics" of floral design, and offer more organic alternatives to the use of traditional plastics and foam in floral design. (Plant Science Classroom)

Backyard Beekeeping*

Presented by Mark Creighton, Apiary Inspector, CT Ag Experiment Station. Participants will gain a better understanding of the role pollinators play in support of Connecticut's agriculture. Arc Welding 101

Program will provide an overview of the Department's surface water quality monitoring programs including LIS, freshwater rivers/streams, and beaches. Participants will have the opportunity to "sample" a stream for physical parameters using DEEP's monitoring equipment, and learn about opportunities for volunteers to assist with data collection. Living with Black Bears

Presented by Allen Petell, DEEP Master Wildlife Conservationist. Black Bears are back, with more than 4,450 sightings in CT communities in just the past year! Learn what to do (and what NOT to do) when you encounter a bear, what attracts bears to yards, how Black Bears compare with other North American bear species, foods that attract bears, and how to discourage bears from visiting your yard. (Ag Mechanics Classroom)
