
The BPC work party scheduled for April 21 also had to be cancelled, due to a work emergency by the leader, **Dave Beaudette**.

MEET THE MEMBERS - GENIE DETHLOFF

Genie Dethloff lives in Killingworth with her husband Lloyd and her Papillion Trinket. She moved here six years ago from Ann Arbor, MI and loves how horsey the area is.

Genie says it all started when she was seven. Her father was taking her nine year old sister for her first horseback riding lesson and Genie asked if she could come and watch. After the lesson her dad asked her sister if she wanted to come again – she said no but Genie tugged on his sleeve and said she sure would; she has been riding ever since. She rode hunt seat in her earlier years when she took weekly lessons and spent summers at riding camps. She owned her first horse at age 24, an Appaloosa she named Blanco (white in Spanish as he had no spots) that she bought for \$350, and had fun out in the country riding him down dirt roads for hours and jumping jumps in a field. Then she found dressage in her 30s and has stuck with that ever since.



Looking for ways to combine her love of animals with her desire to help people, she spent many years in Michigan volunteering in a therapeutic riding program. She was certified as a therapeutic riding instructor but due to an injury and subsequent surgery she didn't start teaching - then work and child took over her life. She spent a year in Connecticut volunteering at High Hopes and hopes to start volunteering again in a small program in the area.

She did not own a horse again until she was 40 and since has owned a Morgan, a Hanoverian, two Norwegian Fjords, and a Paint (also with no spots!). She bought the sorrel Paint mare Hope after two lung surgeries for cancer when she was feeling very vulnerable. Hope took good care of her during her recovery as Hope was a very willing, reliable, and safe mount.

Genie loves the challenge (both physically and mentally) of dressage and has no problem spending hours in the arena working on her dressage skills. After working with several trainers she found her dressage guru in Patricia Norcia. With Patricia's tutelage she is starting to move up the levels in dressage. After several years, it became clear that Hope just couldn't advance in dressage with Genie as she has arthritis in her hocks and spine. When Hope was lame, Genie started riding Patricia's bay Lusitano mare Lilly, and continued to ride her as she put Hope back to work. Part of the trick was finding a horse to ride that was





naturally talented for dressage - when she started leasing Lilly she started to progress more quickly. Due to her health, Hope has been semi-retired and is on a half-lease to a family with young girls who can really appreciate a very well trained, safe horse.

As Genie loves owning her own horses and was looking for a dressage partner, she recently purchased a five year old, untrained grey Andalusian mare, Krystal. She is greatly enjoying the process of helping Patricia start her new horse. Right now the young women are riding Krystal in lessons with Patricia but Genie has asked her husband for a protective riding vest for her 60th birthday in May so that she can start riding her mare. Krystal is very sweet and willing and has great potential to excel in dressage and hopefully will be Genie's dressage partner well into her 70s.



Genie has had a few careers, 20+ years in medical and public health research, then computer support and training followed by website design and development. She retired early and now considers advancing in dressage to be her career. Now that she has three horses to keep going, it does take up as much time as a job.

Genie learned about LCRVHC when she was still in Michigan and owned a Norwegian Fjord, but was planning a move to Connecticut. She met Vanessa Weber, a fellow Fjord owner, through a Fjord group and Vanessa told her about the area. Vanessa sent her many posts about proposed changes to regulations in Connecticut that would limit horseback riders' use of an extensive trail system that they had used for many years and a club, LCRVHC, that was fighting the regulations. As she had plans to trail ride and the club's mission preserving trails seemed important, going to a club meeting was one of Genie's first activities in her new home in Killingworth. Luckily Genie loves her arena work as she sure hasn't made it out on the trails much – oh well!

Her first year here she volunteered to stand out in the cold as a crossing guard at the Fall Festival Hunter Pace. The next year the hunter pace chairman was looking for someone to co-chair and eventually take over so Genie stepped in. She has been co-chairing the hunter pace each year since. When the person who managed the LCRVHC website was moving away, Genie was able to use one of her skillsets to help the club in another way as web master. Next she used her background in graphics and her computer skills to take over as editor of the newsletter, a job she did until 2012 when Sue Davenport kindly took the job back. She seemed to always be around when someone wanted to give up a job for the club, so when her friend Shirley Tirrell had had enough as Secretary, Genie stepped in. Luckily she enjoys advancing her skills in Excel and loves making new layouts of the membership data file to share. She has enjoyed her time on the Board of Directors and encourages others in the club to give it a try. So I guess you could say Genie did find LCRVHC's mission to be important and has made an effort to use her skills to help out.
